alent in the Cedar Valley is holding strong. The past few years, we have seen an uptick in the regional labor force. While talent and population growth continues to be top of mind for businesses, it is important to remember that this barrier is seen across the country. The Cedar Valley has taken a proactive approach to talent attraction by regional branding, placemaking and reducing barriers.

Development in the Cedar Valley has looked a little different. There has been a decrease in the number of permits against a steady increase in the valuations over the last two-and-a-half years, suggesting a focus on fewer but larger developments.

Industry Diversity

Additionally, there are many ways to measure the economy. Grow Cedar Valley came across some additional data earlier this year. The Waterloo/Cedar Falls, Iowa Metropolitan Statistical Area ranks 86 out of 382 metros across the U.S. for industry diversity; this includes MSA's of all sizes. It is no surprise that capital-intensive manufacturing and engineering-intensive manufacturing in the Cedar Valley significantly outpace other MSAs; very few MSAs can speak to having high ranks in both. A region with high diversity can signal economic stability and more easily withstand economic pressures.






